A comprehensive management plan prepared in 2004 forms the basis of an agreement between the Minster Chapter and Natural England to actively preserve this very rare and special site.





The grasslands are managed using traditional methods to maintain and enhance the variety of plants and wildlife. In Autumn hardy sheep graze the site to trample in the seeds thereby aiding their spread and germination.

Work on the site has resulted in a noticeable increase in the biodiversity of the grasslands. Over 200 plant species have now been identified including 4 orchid species, Southern Marsh, Common Spotted, Bee and Pyramidal.







Volunteers undertake work ranging from from fence and hedge maintenance to pulling up invasive plants. Surveys are carried out to record the flora and fauna on site and the large number of butterflies, moths and other insects.



The National Curriculum encourages outdoor learning and the grasslands provide an excellent educational resource. School groups can learn about the history, geography and geology of the site as well as identification of flora and fauna.
