Face coverings are currently required in places of worship, so please wear one inside the Cathedral unless you have a medically recognised reason not to do so.

Thank you for providing your name and contact details when you registered for or arrived at this service. This measure is in support of the NHS's Test and Trace programme. Your personal details will be stored securely for 21 days in compliance with data protection regulations, and will then be securely disposed of. If during that time someone who has been at the service tests positive for Covid-19, you will be contacted by the NHS.

This service will be livestreamed to the internet, and will be available at www.southwellminster.org/worship-online and on the Minster's YouTube channel. Livestreaming allows those joining from home to participate in the same act of worship as those in the Cathedral.

Communion will be received in silence in one kind only (bread); the Church teaches that Holy Communion is received fully in either the consecrated wafer or the wine. Please follow the instructions of Churchwardens to approach the sanctuary. Please make use of the hand sanitiser dispenser provided as you approach. There will be 2-metre spaces marked on the floor of the aisle; please observe these to keep social distance. Please keep your face covering in place until you have received the host in your hand, and replace it after consuming the host. After receiving Communion, please return to your seat via the side aisles. Gluten-free wafers are available. Please speak to a Churchwarden before the service (if possible) to request one.

The Easter Liturgy

From earliest times Christians have gathered through the night of Easter to recall the story of God's saving work, from creation through to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. However, the Easter Liturgy is not merely a presentation of God's work. It is meant to be a real experience of new life for the worshipper, a passing from darkness to light which offers hope to all the faithful. It is therefore important that the preparation is prayerful and thorough.

The Vigil of Readings – which ordinarily is an integral part of this service, but this year has formed a separate online event, in order to prevent an unduly long celebration in accordance with current Covid-19 guidelines – marks the end of the emptiness of Holy Saturday, and leads into the celebration of Christ's resurrection. The singing of the Exsultet, the ancient hymn of triumph and rejoicing, links this night of our Christian redemption to the Passover night of Israel's redemption out of Egypt. Christian baptism is a participation in the death and resurrection of Christ, a dying to sin in order to be reborn in him, and the Easter Liturgy was from early Christian times a preferred occasion for baptism. It is fittingly a time when those who are already Christians may repeat with renewed commitment the promises of their own baptism, and strengthen their sense of incorporation into the royal and priestly ministry of the whole people of God. The Easter Gospel is proclaimed with all the joy and splendour that the church can find, and the Eucharist is celebrated in the glorious light of the Resurrection. All the resources of the church – music, flowers, bells, colours – are used to celebrate Christ's resurrection. The 'Alleluia', which has been silent throughout Lent, returns.

ORDER OF SERVICE

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

Please stand as the ministers arrive in silence, the Deacon carrying the unlit Easter Candle.

The President, turning to the kindled fire, prays:

Eternal God,
who made this most holy night
to shine with the brightness of your one true light:
set us aflame with the fire of your love,
and bring us to the radiance of your heavenly glory;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
Amen.

The President traces on the Easter Candle the sign of the cross, the Greek letters Alpha and Omega, and the numbers of the current year, saying:

Christ yesterday and today,
the beginning and the end,
Alpha and Omega,
all time belongs to him,
and all ages; to him be glory and power,
through every age and for ever.
Amen.

The President then places five grains of incense into the Easter Candle, saying:

By his holy and glorious wounds
may Christ our Lord guard us and keep us.
Amen.

The President lights the Easter Candle with the taper, saying:

May the light of Christ, rising in glory,
banish all darkness from our hearts and minds.

The Deacon, bearing the Easter Candle, enters the Cathedral followed by the other ministers. They pause just inside the entrance, and the Deacon raises the candle.

The procession moves into the building and pauses again. The candles of the ministers are lit from the Easter Candle.

The procession continues to the front of the Nave and pauses a third time. The candles of the congregation are lit.

The Easter Candle is placed in its stand and the ministers move to their seats.

EXSULTET

The Deacon sings the traditional Easter song of praise. As communal singing is not currently permitted, the choir sings the responses on behalf of the whole congregation.

Rejoice, heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels!
Exult, all creation around God's throne!
Jesus Christ, our King, is risen!
Sound the trumpet of salvation!
Rejoice, O earth, in shining splendour,

by whose blood the homes of all the faithful
are hallowed and protected.

This is the night when of old you saved our fathers,

This is the night when Jesus Christ vanquished hell
and rose triumphant from the grave.

This is the night when all who believe in him
are freed from sin and restored to grace and holiness.

Most blessed of all nights,
when wickedness is put to flight and sin is washed away,
lost innocence regained, and mourning turned to joy.

Night truly blessed, when heaven is wedded to earth
and all creation reconciled to God!

Therefore, heavenly Father, in the joy of this holy night,
accept our sacrifice of praise, your Church's solemn offering;
as we gaze upon the splendour of this flame,
fed by melting wax conceived by mother bee;
and grant that this Easter candle may make our darkness light;
for Christ the Morning Star has risen, never again to set,
and is alive and reigns for ever and ever.

Amen.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

NEW TESTAMENT READING *read by Owen Sparkes*

Romans 6: 3-11

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

As we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead, we remember that through the paschal mystery we have died and been buried with him in baptism, so that we may rise with him to a new life within the family of his Church. Now that we have completed our observance of Lent, we renew the promises made at our baptism, affirming our allegiance to Christ, and our rejection of all that is evil. Therefore I ask these questions:

Do you turn to Christ?

I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins?

I repent of my sins.

Do you renounce evil?

I renounce evil.

Do you believe and trust in God the Father?

**I believe in God,
the Father almighty,
creator of heaven and earth.**

Do you believe and trust in his Son Jesus Christ?

**I believe in Jesus Christ,
his only Son, our Lord,
who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,
born of the Virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, died, and was buried;
he descended to the dead.
On the third day he rose again;
he ascended into heaven,
he is seated at the right hand of the Father,
and he will come to judge the living and the dead.**

Do you believe and trust in the Holy Spirit?

**I believe in the Holy Spirit,
the holy catholic Church,
the communion of saints,
the forgiveness of sins,
the resurrection of the body,
and the life everlasting.

Please leave your face covering in place as you come up for Communion until you have received the host wafer in your hand, then remove your face covering to consume the host, then replace it before returning to your seat via the side aisles.

Gluten-free wafers are available on request. If you would prefer to receive a blessing (without physical contact), please bring this order of service with you as an indication. If you are unable to move to the altar, please inform a Churchwarden and the President will come to you.

Please sit or kneel on your return from Communion.
