I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. 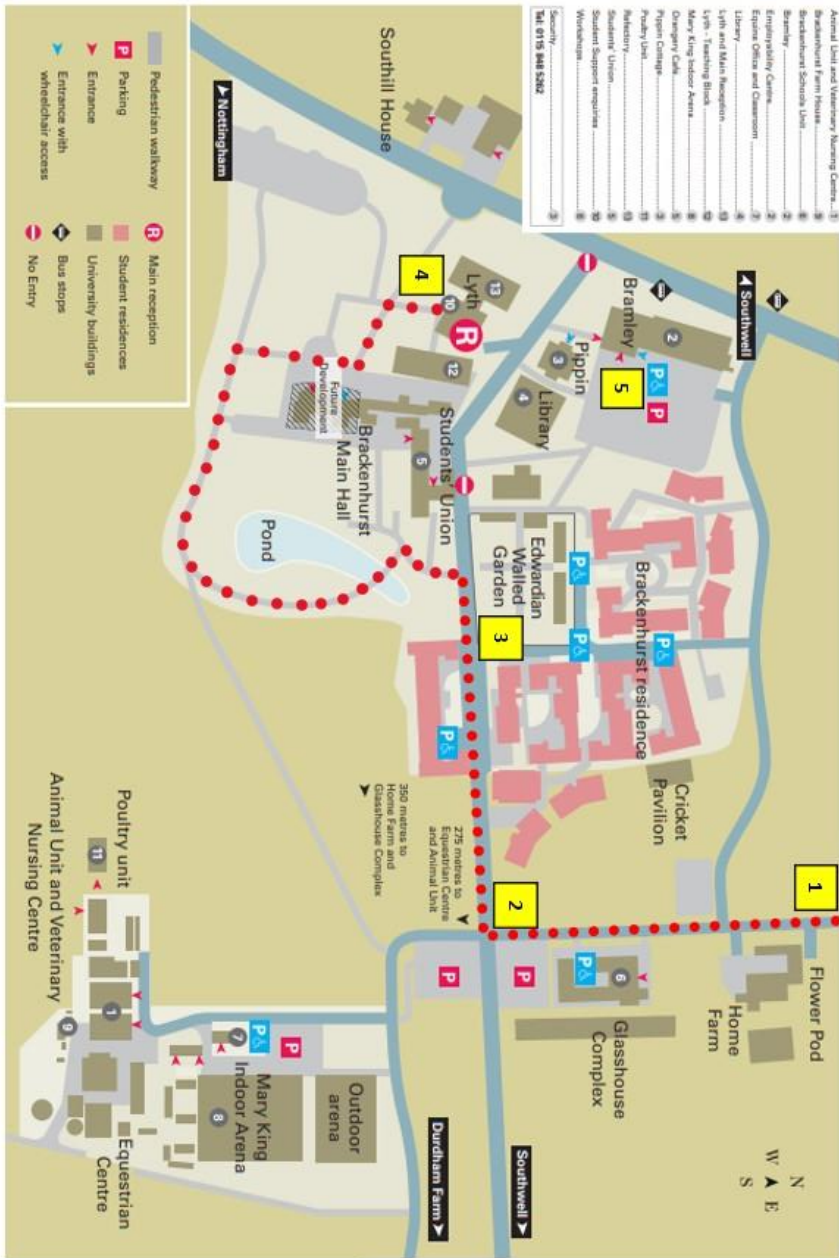
